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

1ST PLACE ESSAY-RT

PROFESSIONAL CARING IN RADIOGRAPHY

"Professionalism" is a term that has been widely discussed in thie last few years by those individuals concerned with upgrading the professional standing of Radilogic Technology. Recently, several major advancements have been made toward this goal. It was announced at the National Meeting of the American College of Radiology, on September 24, 1980 that radiographers are professionals and should be recognized as such. In August of 1981, the Health Professions Training and Distribution Act (S-2375) was signed by President Reagan. bill mandates that states shall establish minimum educational standards for operators of equipment that emits ionizing radiation.

Indeed through legislation and recognition the field of radiologic technology will gain the status it deserves in the public mind. However there is an issue that must be dealt with before the profession can assume its right-gul place in the field of health care. The issue that is foremost in the mind of the public and those in the field is the nature of professionalism.

As defined by Websters New Collegiate Dictionary, a professional is "Characterized by or conforming to the technical or ethical standards of a profession". Radiographers conform to technical or ethical standards when they support professional organizations. Radiographers conform to ethical standards when they demonstrate the well being of patients as primary concern, and promote the caring image of the professional radiographer.

In retrospect, "within the profession there appears to be a general malaise, a feeling of inferiority in the role of the radiologic technologist as compared with other health care specialists".2

Apathy, in radiologic technology is running rampart. "Less than 20 percent of radiographers registered by the A.R.R.T. recognize and participate in their professional responsibilities, through membership in their professional organizations."3 What is the source of this degenerating malaise? Can it be contributed solely to the lack of involvement in professional organizations, or nonparticipation in the continuing education programs that help radiographers keep up with the advances in technology. These factors only contribute to the apathy that is undermining our profession. Certainly lack of recognition at the professional organizational level is debilitating. However, the most common cause for dissatisfaction among radiographers stems from the types of, or lack of, interactions radiographers have with their closest associates: Radiologists, administrators, coworkers, and patients.

Lack of recongition from superiors, or feedback about performance, produces radiographers that feel their contribution is worthless and their potential unrealized. When radiographers are in this position their pessimistic attitudes are reflected in the way they deal with patients. It becomes difficult to interact with patients when preoccupied with low professional esteem. Only when the patient feels he is being treated by a "professional", in a "professional" manner, will the field of radiologic technology receive the respect it is due. If we fail to gain patient 'support, or "grass roots" support from the people we serve, then our campaign will be futile. If technologists maintain the status quo by an unwillingness to update skills and project professional attitudes, then we have failed to pass on benefits of our expertise and skills to the patient-- our primary concern.

The issue of professionalism is of primary concern to the patient, since we provide service that is related to patient well being. Any missuse of our technical knowledge or failure to recognize ethical considerations involving patient care could inflict lasting damage on the patient.

"Primum non nocere" is an ancient medical dictum that translates "first do no harm". If the profession of radiologic technology is devoted to serving this treatise, then we must evaluate the following issues in regard to our service.

Frequently, technologists fail to observe the most elementary rules of radiation safety -- protection. Technologists will often say, "I was in a hurry and forgot to sheild" or "don't worry the patient is too old for x-ray to hurt him" or "just one film without sheilding won't hurt". How often do radiographers try to rationalize failure to provide the basis right of adequate shielding and protection? When this rationalization takes place, the image of the whole profession is damaged. Failure of technologists to live up to the highest ethical morals leaves us all vulnerable to attach.

Occasionaly, patients state they were not shielded during previous examinations, so why do they need shielding now; or more frequently, why wasn't I shilded during my last procedure? Hence, technologist credibility is threatened and the reputation of the profession is downgraded.

Another common patient complaint or observation is the manner in which the patient was physically handled. Unnecessary roughness when moving patients never makes a favorable impression. When the

radiographer is in a hurry to complete an examination the patient is rushed and feels that little concern is given to his fear of falling. Also positioning of radiographs seems to be more important than assuring the patient that they won't fall off the table.

Impatience by the technologist often magnifies this problem. Perhaps the most damning statement of all was made by a patient in an inter-"One of the more personally disturbing interviews I had was with a sixty year old highly edecated, very articulate, pleasant man who had just undergone an angiographic procedure. He had glowing remarks about the departmeent, and at the end of the interview I casually summarized his responses with the statement, "Well it seems as though you found our technologists very proficient," and he quickly replied, "Oh, honey, I didn't have technologists -- they were nurses." Our professional image is being determined by the conduct of a few uncaring radiographers. Unless we take steps to gain patient trust and support we will have to live with an unfavorable opinion from our clients -- the patient.

The caring professional is eagar to gain the confidence of the patient in order to facilitate interaction between them. In the field of Radiology, the radiographer usually has only one or two meetings with the patient. This places tremendous pressure on the radiographer to make a favorable impression and to gain patient trust.

Hospitalization is a traumatic experience. Not only must the patient learn to deal with his illness, but also with new surroundings, new routines, and new individuals of the health care team.

As health care professionals, radio-

graphers have a responsibility to genuinely care for their patients emotional well being. Often an approach to caring is to be familiar or casual in their introduction to the patient. Unfortunately, the approach backfires. In attempting to establish confidence or trust, the health professional tries to show, by both actions and words that he can be trusted with that patient's health needs.

Some common actions that are subject to dual interpretations include: (1) The health professional shares some secrets or private jokes with the patient, and there is an exclusiveness about the relationship. (2) The health professional and patient are on a first name basis. (3) The health professional tries to distinguish himself from the other health workers, by simply wearing a flower in his lapel, or by much more marked (4) The health professional spends extra time with the patient, and appears to give him priority over the other patients.

Some patients tolerate the above and similar behavior very well. Others, however, realize that they are being treated differently from other patients and are unable to understand it. Rather than being pleased by this extra attention, they may grow distrustful.⁴

Apparently, the only way that radiographers can establish an acceptable raport with patients is to become familiar with and to practice those principles that denota a professional manner.

Erich Fromm's The Art of Loving, states guidelines for meaningful relation-ships both personally and professionally:

- Concern--encouraging the growth or progress of the other person.
- Responsibility--responding to the other not simply out of duty rather as a voluntary desire to meet the needs of the other person.

- 3. Respect--realizing the individuality of the other person.
- 4. Knowledge--trying to discover what is important to the other person.⁵

If allied health personnel follow these basic guidelines when dealing with patients, interaction with the patient will be more veneficial to all converned.

Dignity is a word that is often associated with those individuals who are professional in their manner. Certainly, radiographers whould be dignified when interacting with patients while at the same time respecting their dignity. Leaving a patient on the x-ray table, exposed, definitely fails to maintain patient Holding conversations dignity. with coworkers while performing an examination inflicts a loss of privacy. Not only is the patients loss of privacy affected, but also the radiographer diminishes the dignity of the profession when behaving in an unprofessional manner.

If radiographers feel the need to be recognized as professionals, they must act in a professional manner. When we treat our patient with respect and dignity, then we will receive their support in our fight for professional recognition.





UPDATE ON LEGISLATION

On Jan. 19, 1982 at 8:00 pm in Hearing Room #4 of the Capitol Building in Jefferson City HB908 and HB1095 were presented to the Licensure and Related Activities Committee. HB908 was presented by Lloyd Baker, Representative of Moberly. HB1095 was presented by Representative Howard Garrett of Festus.

Testifying for the bills presented were Aileen Hulsey, President-Elect, MSRT; James Watson, President, MSRT; Barbara Wagner Hente, student in Nuclear Medicine Technology; Dr. Joseph Sommers, President-Elect of the Missouri Radiological Society, and Norman L. Hente, Editor of the RADIOGRAPHER. Judy Foeste, Immediate Past-President, MSRT, submitted written testimony.

Testimony against the bills was presented by Jerry Sill, Registered Lobbyist for the Missouri Hospital Association; Larry Kruse, Registered Lobbyist on the staff of the Missouri Osteopathic Association and John Mattews, President-Elect of the Missouri Medical Association.

Following the testimony for the bills Representative Baker suggested that it would be best if the Committee on Licensure and Related Activities were to work on a compromise between the two bills. Representative Johnnie Aikens, Chairman of the Committee assured Representative Baker that the Committee would do just that.

Participants were greeted by Mr. Morris Henderson, Exec. Dir. of SLCNHC and Myrtle Davis, Deputy Director. Panelists for the program were Beth Anderhub, Norman Hente and Michael D. Ward. Mr. Hente presented a slide presentation on the "Consumer-Patient Radiation Health and Safety Act of 1981" after which prepared and spontaneous questions were fielded by the panel. Interviewers for the program were Charles McGill, Al Ross, and Mafalda Pierce. After much discussion the program was adjourned at 3:30 pm and Barbara Cole directed those in attendance on a tour of the faculty.

The M.S.R.T. thanks the SLCNHC for the opportunity to discuss todays legislative efforts with area technologists.

On Thursday, Jan. 14, 1982, at 7:30 pm at Deachoness Hospital, Aona DeClue spoke on "State Licensure - What Is It All About?". Aona who is an Instructor of Radiologic Technology in the School of Health Related Professions at the University of Missouri-Columbia is also a registered lobbyist for the Missouri Society of Radiologic Technologists, as well as Eastern Counselor for the M.S.R.T. She spoke on two bills currently before the House of Representatives, HB908 and HB 1095 and then answered questions from those present (35).

At the end of the meeting everyone felt that they knew a great deal more about legislation supported by the M.S.R.T.

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Fellow Imagers,

I have two goals this year. The First, the revitalization of the Missouri Society of Radiologic Technologists. The Second, the passage of the M.S.R.T. sponsored legislation.

The revitalization of this society must come from three sources. The first source if the Board of Directors. This Board must continue to work as a homogenour unit for the common good of all the radiologic technologists in the state. This Board must work harder and longer and above all be better listeners and more responsive to the membership of this Society.

The second source are the Committee Chairpersons. Some of the committies have had problems in the past and will have problems in the future. By learning from the past they must try to eleminate those problems from reoccurring. The Board must make sure these chairpersons know what their respective duties are in ample time to carry out these instructions. The membership must make themselves available to these chairpersons and be willing to give their time to serve.

I have asked the Education committee chairman to plan more educational seminars in different parts of the state to make this opportunity available to more technologists. I have asked the Public Relations Committee chairman to make the term Radiologic Technologist, and what it stands for, more widely known in this state so the public will know who we are and what we do and that we, the Radiologic Technologist's of the State of Missouri, are not NURSES!

The Third and by far most important source of revitalization is YOU the member. The time has come for you to quit sitting around complaining about what the Missouri Society is

going to do for you and start finding out what you, the Technologist can do for your society. Right now this society represents about 15% of the working technologsts in this state. The first thing you can do for your society is increase our numbers. I am charging each and every member in this state to enlist one new member. Just ONE. I want you to get this new member right now! Don't wait until next week or next month, do it now.

The second thing you can do for your society is make your wishes known to someone who can do something about it. I have requested the Board to be more responsive to the members, but in order for them to do that they have to know what you want. If you have a problem or would like something changed or started, tell your District Representative. That person is your voice on the Board.

The second item I am going to work on this year is our Bill that will be before the State Lawmakers this year. I think this year is the best year yet to pass our bill but you have to work for it. The Federal Bill is now law. The time has come for every technologist in this state to do something to help. Call your local Representative, write a letter expressing your support, and get a group together and go to the capital and talk to him and to anyone who will listen. This is the only way we will get the bill we want. If you wait for someone else to do it, it will not get done.

In order for you to have a strong viable organization you, the membership, must start carrying the load. You have to bring new people into your organization to increase membership. You have to tell us which direction you want this organization to take. You have to lobby for our bill. Without you this organization cannot and will not survive.



Nominating Committee Guidelines

Since we all are involved in the vitally important selection of our officers and regional directors, the following is provided for you information. These yuidelines are the operational guides for the Nominating Committee in completion of the standing charge to provide you, the voting member, an official selection of candidates. Check this guide carefully if you intend on nominating an individual for office, or if your state is nominating for Regional Director. Any variance of this procedure must be documented in writing and sent to the chairman of the Nominating Committee, Linda Neiss, R.T., 98 Walsron Lane Extension, Troy, New York 12180.

Guidelines:

- 1. The Executive Director shall communicate with the Nominating Committee Chairman. The letter should include a timetable for submission of reports, the dates the office must receive resumes and position statements.
- 2. Nominees shall be solicited through a notice in the ASRT SCANNER, as well

- as letters to all affiliate presidents. The notification should be a reminder to nominate colleagues who are most capable of leadership, also included shall be a list of the criteria for selection and a list of the duties and responsibilities of officers. The SCANNER shall also announce the deadline for nomination(December 15), but should encourage the early submission of names.
- The Chairman of the Nominating Committee shall send a letter to nominees indicating they have been nominated for office within ten (10) days of the receipt of the nomination. Included with that communication shall be a list of the qualifications for office, a resume form, a request for a written statement from the nominee regarding their willingness to serve in the specific office for which they have been nominated. They should also be asked to respond in like manner if they do not wish to serve in an elected office. nominees should be reminded that they must submit a position statement upon notification of their eligibility for candidacy and that these items must be submitted immediately.
- 4. The Nominating Committee members shall forward all nominee information to the Chairman, who in return shall verify credentials.
- 5. Upon receipt of the resumes and consents to serve, a letter should be sent by the committee Chairman to the nominees, informing them that the material was received and that about January 4th they will receive a letter verifying their eligibility for the office to which they have been nominated.
- 6. Upon verification of credentials, each nominee will be sent a written notification of their acceptance as a candidate. The candidate shall be requested to forward a position statement for publication and inclusion with the ballot to be received by the Executive Director by January 18th. The candidate shall be reminded that information is to be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and advised that failure to have the statement submitted by January 18th will mean that only their name and resume will be printed in the Scanner and on the ballot.
- 7. The Chairman of the committee shall at all times keep the members of the committee aware of the candidates for office, and shall ask for their continual input.
- Candidates shall be placed on the ballot for the office for which they are nominated.
- 9. In the event there are no candidates for any specific office(s), candidates for other offices may be contacted and offered the opportunity to accept nomination for the other office, providing:
 - a. The committee agrees upon whom to contact.
 - The candidates contacted understand they are not obliged to make any change.
 - The names of other candidates for any office are not divulged to the candidates.
 - The candidate(s) accepting nomination for the office in question
 - submit a letter to the Chairman verifying acceptance of the change. The names of candidates accepting changes in office are to remain on the ballot in the originally accepted office until the letter of acceptance is received.

Timetable:

- October 15th Report of committee members to Chairman with resumes and additional information relevant to the nominees. The committee Chairman is to verify credentials of the candidate through the Executive Office. A list of nominees for verification will be sent to the Executive Director with no offices designated.
- November 15th Preliminary report of the list of nominees from the Chairman to the committee members. If there are no nominees for specific offices, the committee shall discuss and must agree on whom to contact relevant to filling vacant positions.
- December 15th Deadline for submission of nominations to the committee.

 Nominations postmarked after this date will not be accepted.
- January 4th Letter to nominees verifying their eligibility for the office to which they have been nominated.
- January 11th Chairman of the Nominating Committee to prepare a draft of the slate of candidates and submit to the committee for final input.
- January 18th Final committee report with all materials to be submitted by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the Executive Director with the report copied to the committee members.
- March 1st Ballots prepared for mailing no later than that time period as prescribed by the Bylaws. (Final time may vary)

Regional Director Nomination:

Regional Director candidates will be submitted to the Executive Office, not the Nominating Committee. In the event a Regional Director candidate is nominated for an office, the candidate must decide which nomination to accept without prior knowledge of other candidates for either office. (This decision must be made by the candidate without the committee divulging the names of other candidates.)

Notes From The President

The preceding information and guidelines have been provided for your benefit. Questions always seem to arise regarding the Nominating Committee and now you know the exact procedure with which they were charged.

Remember, we have shown that everyday is election day, for throughout every hour of everyday we each exercised our right of choice. We don't have to have a local or national election in order to vote. A man's election can determine the deciding vote--for or against his own success. You ELECT to gain a thorough knowledge of your business, or you don't. You elect to be honest, or you don't. You elect to save a part of what you earn, or you don't. You elect to always do your best or you don't. And, by your own elections you will be defeated--or you will succeed--and we have begun the latter.

Dues Increase Passes

The mail ratification of the bylaws and the dues increase has been completed. The bylaws all were ratified and are effective immediately or as designated. By a 5 to 1 majority (2525 "yes", 464 "no") the dues increase was approved by the members. Effective November 1, 1981 there will be a \$30 across the board increase for all membership categories. This positive vote is a very reassuring support action for ASRT. The Board of Directors will continue to effectively address the financial status of our Society, and you as a member should question if you are in doubt. The answer will be provided and let's keep the dialogue going that was established in Salt Lake City.

Legislative Update

The ASRT continues to draft model legislation as a result of the passage of the "Consumer-Patient Radiation Health and Safety Act of 1981." The model has incorporated unput from ASRT affiliates, legislative advisors, members of the ASRT/ACR Task Force on Legislation, the JRCERT, the ARRT, and a host of other sources. As soon as this model is ready, ASRT will provide you communication. In the meantime, if your state is persuing licensure, do not stop your efforts. Just because the Federal bill passed does not mean that the state level efforts can be discontinued. The opposition to the bill, basically the AMA and the AHA with all their state societies, are urging no further action on the state level. Their stand is to wait and see what the Federal level will produce. In the meantime, if you discontinue your efforts, someone else will take over your space in the legislative arena. Continue to promote legislative efforts in your state and keep in touch with ASRT to receive on going updates as to the national legislative efforts.

Each One Reach One

The Each One Reach One campaign totals have been finalized. Congratulations to all the Regional Chairmen who did a fantastic job. As of August 21, 1981, ASRT gained a grand total of 1043 new members. This achieved a 53% level of our goal of 1981 members. Special mention goes to Regions VII and VIII. Sally Rensch, R.T. of Region VII headed up achievement of 112% of her regional goal. Sandra Ireland, R.T. of Region VIII achieved 103% of her goal. The other regions' percentages were: Region I - 5%, Region II - 30%, Region III - 24%, Region IV - 19%, Region V - 47%, Region VI - 74%, Region IX - 38%, Region X - 4%. Well done to all of you who participated, but now let's continue to reach new members and it is most important to retain those that already belong.

1982 ASRT Balloting Procedure

As directed by the members in Salt Lake City at the Annual Meeting, the balloting procedure has been re-evaluated and redesigned by the Board of Directors to Provide the following procedure for the 1982 ASRT officer and regional director elections:

con't. balloting procedure:

- 1. An independent external tabluation firm will be selected by the Executive Director.
- 2. The Executive Office will verify accuracy of the mailing list to provide one label per voting member.
- 3. The ballot mailing will include:
 - a. Candidate information(biographical sketch and position statement).
 - b. Ballot form
 - c. One return envelope, pre-addressed to the tabulation firm; instructions for the member to include his or her member identification on the outside of the envelope, or the vote/ballot will not be tabulated.
- 4. The tabulation firm will open the envelopes, tabulate the ballots, retain the envelopes and ballots for 90 days after the official installation.

Affiliate Bylaws

At the Post Board Meeting in Salt Lake City, the Board of Directors voted to extend the moratorium on current affiliate bylaws until July 1982. This means that affiliate societies still have time to bring their bylaws into compliance without ASRT Board Review.

ACR Annual Meeting

At the American College of Radiology (ACR) Annual Meeting that was held in Las Vegas, Nevada in September, the members voted to support ASRT through the following statement: "The American Society of Radiologic Technologists has embarked on a membership drive. Because a stable and strong ASRT is to the benefit of all in Radiology, the American College of Radiology actively supports this effort to broaden the ASRT membership base. Radiologists should encourage their radiologic technologists to obtain membership in ASRT as an ideal mechanism for achieving educational goals so necessary for high quality patient care."

I would like to correct the number of votes I reported as being cast for this particular item during the recent voting. I incorrectly reported to you. The final correct count is as follows: 2842 "yes", 518 "no", 27 no vote. The passage still stands at approximately the same ratio.

Legislation Task Force Meets During RSNA

The joint ACR/ASRT Task Force on Legislation that was formed approximately a year ago met to consider the model legislation draft that has been underway for some time. It is hoped that this model legislation will be ready for distribution to the ASRT affiliates and the ACR chapters shortly after the first of the year. For the most part the task force has been working in concert, but disparities still exist. The task force is scheduled to meet again during the month of January to review further revisions that occur after the comments have been compiled. An objective to complete this document as soon as possible, is held by the task force members, but we shall not sacrifice quality and thoroughness for speed. The technologist members of the task force are: Phyllis Thompson, R.T.(T), Marilyn Holland, R.T.(R) Ward M. Keller, R.T.(R), and myself. The radiologist members of the task force are: Helmut Mueller, M.D., Jonathan Stolz, M.D., Mark Mishkin, M.D., and Otha Linton-ACR Staff.

Terminology Clarification

During my legislative activity it becomes increasingly apparent that there are some terms which are being used interchangeably and should not be. This misuse by legislators, physicians, and others, propogates misinformation. It behooves technologists to be able to appropriately utilize the terms. The following are provided for clarification:

ACCREDITATION-The process by which an agency or organization evaluates and recognizes a program of study or an institution as meeting certain predetermined qualifications or standards. It apples only to institutions and their programs of study or their services.

CERTIFICATION-The process by which a nongovernmental agency or association grants recognition to an individual who has met certain predetermined qualifications specified by that agency or association.

LICENSURE-The process by which an agency of government grants permission to persons meeting predetermined qualifications to engage in a given occupation and/or use a particular title or grants permission to institutions to perform specified functions.

REGISTRATION-The process by which qualified individuals are listed on an official roster maintained by a governmental or nongovernmental agency.
